The third issue of *Rangsit Journal of Educational Studies RJES* has contents in three areas: Information Technology, an issue in language education, and learners' language performances. The contributors of six papers are from the ASEAN countries and the United States, reflecting their concern over current educational practices.

Articles 1 and 2 deal with the use of Educational Technology in English teaching, and Information Literacy required in the twenty-first century. Article 3 gives a good picture of English Language Education in Thailand and ASEAN Economic Community (AEC) in 2015 as perceived by the author who is now working for a Thai university. As for Articles 4-6, the authors from Indonesia and Thailand report specific language performances in argumentative writings, vocabulary and reading comprehension achievements via scaffolding techniques, and oral discourse performances at the primary and secondary levels, respectively.
